

Summary

In 20/21 issues were only -32% down on 19/20 in spite of the pandemic. Physical issues were vastly reduced (-81%), but the online offer went quite some way to offset this: ebook and eaudiobook issues were more than double last year (+115%) and the new PressReader service added over 265,000 issues of emagazines and newspapers.

All sites were open for limited opening hours in October, but otherwise every month was effected by lockdown to a greater or lesser degree, so naturally October was the highest issuing month. Only the E-Library remained opened throughout. For the majority of the year, issues of physical items were restricted to customers collecting pre-ordered items at the door - this usage fell neatly into equal halves: reservations of specific titles, and lucky dips.


Since Lucky Dips and Press Reader were both successful new offers, these are explored in more detail below.

Explanatory Notes

Renewals usually account for around a third of physical issues, but were not required for most of 20/21 due to the pandemic causing us to use longer due dates. In fact October was the only full month in 20/21 where renewals were required.

PressReader

PressReader was introduced on Friday 17 April 2020, using lockdown-related external funding. It has been a huge hit, attracting positive comments and accounting for 54% of the year's issues. Explore have identified the budget to be able to renew this resource for 21/22.


Lucky Dips

The lucky dips offer was created to make up for the lack of at shelf browsing during the pandemic. Not all customers have specific titles in mind, so placing reservations on specific titles isn't the right offer for all customers. The online lucky dip form enabled customers to summarise their reading preferences for staff to pick a suitable collection for them.

We handled 1,648 lucky dip requests in total across all three lockdowns, usually for 6 or 10 books in a dip (customer chose).

Children's lucky dips accounted for a greater proportion (55%) of the total than adults (45%)

In all three lockdowns, the number of requests for lucky dips fell dramatically at the end of the period when libraries were due to re-open soon. So while it was a much appreciated offer, this evidence suggests that most customers prefer to wait

Summary

The number of reservations placed in 20/21 was -32% down on 19/20.

Reservations were more key this year than ever, because at shelf browsing was unavailable for most of the year so reservations really came into their own. However broader pandemic factors (limited libraries being open, sheilding, public transport, confidence in sharing tangible assets, etc.) meant that reservations were lower than normal regardless.


The highest month for reservations was July, following the first and only full lockdown, i.e. when customers had three months to make up for.

Explanatory Notes

During Click & Collect reservations form the main part of how libraries lend books. The other part of the click and collect offer is Lucky Dips, which are not are not classed as reservations.

The normal 25p reservation fee was waived for most of 2020 (i.e. April to 28 Sep and then again 5 November 2020 to end April 2021).

Reservations were permitted for most of the pandemic. All through the first lockdown any reservations could be placed, just on the understanding that those for closed branches would take a long time to supply. However during second lockdown (specifically 5 Nov to 1 Dec) and third lockdown (specifically, 7 Jan to 6 Apr) reservations were not permitted for closed branches.



Explore Items Added to Stock

Summary


In 20/21, the number of items added to stock was 14% higher than in 19/20, due to in large part to e-library acquisitions.

We added over 7000 online magazine and newspaper titles in one big batch in April 2020, plus throughout the year we doubled the ebook (+96%) and eaudiobook (+116%) acquisitions compared to last year.

The physical items added to stock were affected greatly by the pandemic, and the associated closure of our main book supplier. Early in the year there were some months where no physical items were accessioned. By the end of the year, we have caught up on new publications. However we have accepted far fewer donations due to the pandemic, and therefore physical items added to stock ends the year at -30% on last year.

Explanatory Notes

These figures include donations (of which there have been a reduced number during the pandemic, for risk management reasons), and occasionally retrospective cataloguing of older material. Paid for acquisitions are by far the greatest proportion of the figure (97% this year).



Web Visits

Summary

Web visits in 20/21 were well down (-72%) on 19/20. There is a reduction in visits to both the catalogue site and the main site, but it's a heavier reduction in the main site.

Since one quarter of our web visits normally originate from the public network PCs in libraries, where the Explore Website is the homepage, a large part of the drop can be accounted for simply by the fact that the PC offer was so much reduced.

The usage was lowest in Q1, when the libraries were completely closed, and highest in October when all libraries were open.


During normal times web visits have previously been most frequently about supporting face to face library usage - we know from the pages people visit that they are usually looking into getting a YorkCard, attending an event, or checking opening hours and addresses to arrange a visit. Whereas during 20/21 the use of the website has been less about supporting face to face use, and more about online services - some of the most heavily visited pages are about online services.

Searches of Online Reference Sources


Summary

Genealogy has been a big lockdown hit, and has attracted some very positive customer feedback. 'Ancestry' use was 7.5 times higher than 19/20, as customers responded well to being able to use it from home temporarily, where normally it is an on site only offer. The rise in 'Find May Past' is less pronounced (+37%) due to there being a usage cap in place keeping it more in line with previous use, and usage of the other combined resources has fallen (-29%).

Explanatory Notes

Most reference sites are either always available from home, or were temporarily made so during lockdown ('Ancestry', 'British Newspaper Archive', 'Find My Past'). Only 'Which' and' 'Access to Research' were unavailable from home throughout lockdown, but these form a negligable part of our reference suite.

The only month where non-genealogy reference sites had a visible spike was April, and this was likely related to a staff training exercise.



Summary

For most of the year, the number of people joining as library members was around half its pre-pandemic levels, but Q4 was lower, so the end of year figure was -68% on 19/20.


We continue to attract new members throughout lockdowns, including the full lockdown of Spring 2020, due people being attracted by our substantial online offer.

The poorer performance in Q4 was largely just in comparison with the previous Q4 rather than being low in its own right. Previously we used to get a lot of new members during the residents festival due to issuing combined Library cards and YorkCards. This spike didn't occure this year because the residents festival didn't take place (or not in a normal way) and also because residents can now buy a YorkCard without becoming a library member if they choose.

Explanatory Notes

People can join online 24/7 and start borrowing ebooks etc. immediately without needing libraries to be open.

The new YorkCard launched in December enables people to get a YorkCard without necessarily joining the library. This is a positive step forward in terms of customer service, but also means that it's not inevitable to get a large peak in library joining whenever YorkCard sales are high.



Public PC sessions used at Explore Libraries

Summary


PC sessions in 20/21 were -88% on 19/20, due to reduced capacity caused by the pandemic. If comparing the used sessions with this year's capacity, rather than with previous performance, during lockdowns we tended to run at near capacity at York, but slightly less than capacity at Acomb and Tang Hall. There were 1,213 unique users compared to 5,933 the year before.

In October, when all the libraries were open all month, Huntington and Clifton got the closest to normal performance (i.e. half the normal number of sessions in line with having half their normal number of PCs).

Explanatory Notes

Due to social distancing, in 20/21 we tended to offer either 14 or 29 PCs, depending on the level of lockdown, out of 73 normally offered.

Dunnington and New Earswick are the only branches who normally offer PCs but who were not able to offer them in 20/21 due to social distancing.



Physical Vists to Explore Libraries

Summary

Footfall to libraries in 20/21 was 11% of that seen in 19/20, due to all the opening hours and capacity restrictions caused by the pandemic. None of the libraries achieved over 20%.

A lot of usage went online, as seen in other parts of this report. Physical visits to the buildings tended to be transaction based, picking up a book or using a PC, whereas in normal times customers are able to spend time in the buildings for many other reasons, such as attending a class or just wanting to feel part of a wider community.

Explanatory Notes

For the purpose of CYC monitoring, we use the CIPFA definition of libraries, which excludes Explore's reading cafes. This has the benefit of making reporting more stable, since the reading cafes are subject to big fluctuations caused by weather and flooding.
