Message from the Chair

It has been an extraordinary year for Explore and a year that really showed us all that while we offer brilliant libraries and archives, Explore does so much more as well. Our staff have been there for our communities during some of the most challenging times most of us have ever seen. Energy prices and the cost of living have pushed us all to the limit as the world faces huge challenges with climate change and the war in Ukraine. But throughout we have been there. A tribute to Fiona Williams

In May 2023 we were profoundly saddened to learn of the death of Fiona Williams, former Chief Executive of Explore York Libraries and Archives.

Fiona was a visionary leader who had a distinguished career in libraries culminating in a move to York in 2004 where she developed a new vision for libraries and archives in the city. Under Fiona's leadership, in 2014 Explore York became the UK's first public library mutual owned by its staff and the community. Explore's thriving archives, libraries and reading cafés and passionate workforce are a fitting legacy and a testament to her vision.

Message from the Chief Executive



Our new Chief Executive, Jenny Layfield joined Explore in January 2023.

Jenny brings a fresh approach to Explore having worked in the cultural and heritage sector in various roles, most recently as Museum Director at the National Coal Mining Museum for England and before that for the National Trust. True to our mutual values, staff and community directors were involved in recruiting Jenny from drafting the role profile to participating in interviews.

In a city of approximately 200,000 residents Explore has an impressive array of statistics:

- 724,717 visits to our Libraries
- 79,118 engagements with our Archives
- Over 2,571 events attended by 39,578 people
- 10,628 new library members
- 430,712 visits to our website
- 18,914 volunteer hours

Our commitment to enriching the lives of everyone and strengthening communities by creating an inclusive sense of place and belonging remains strong and was even more important in 2022 as we moved from a pandemic into a cost-of-living crisis. We have continued to be here for the people of York, providing warm, safe and welcoming spaces which support and enrich the lives of everyone who comes through our doors.

We are integral to York’s cultural ecology; demonstrated by the fantastic news in November that we would be an Arts Council National Portfolio Organisation, one of only 16 library services across the country. This accolade recognised our commitment to creating opportunities that challenge imaginations through high-quality cultural experiences in the heart of communities. The new Haxby & Wigginton Library within the Oaken Grove Community Centre opened on 4 January. This is a classic Explore success story because it was developed with the community, for the community and

funded by City of York Council. We share the building with Haxby and Wigginton Youth and Community Association and with them we are developing new links. We are in the heart of our communities and work with our communities to provide more of what they want. But there are significant financial challenges, as this year has proven. Our contract with City of York Council currently provides two thirds of our income so if we want to do more we need to raise more. I will be spending the next year working with internal and external stakeholders to develop the vision for Explore for the next five years and looking for those opportunities which build on what we do, but also build our financial and environmental sustainability.

I want to end with saying thank you to all of you: our staff, volunteers, friends, community members, customers, supporters and partners. In my first few months I have been blown away with the welcome I have received and demonstrable commitment and love for Explore I have seen. I am incredibly fortunate to have been given this opportunity and look forward to working with you all in the years to come.

People shape Explore

Our network of libraries and archives means Explore is embedded in every community in York. Volunteers shaping our story

Recent years have brought huge challenges to our communities with more people suffering financial and social hardship.

Volunteers are our ears on the ground, rooted in communities and facing the same challenges. Volunteers help us do so much more by helping out so our staff can focus on growth and doing more of what people want. We need our volunteers now more than ever. Last year volunteers gave an amazing 18,914 hours of their time, equivalent to around £250,000 of staff time. Their stories show how volunteering made a difference to their wellbeing too, helping them gain new skills, experience and confidence.



"When Alice started volunteering she was being bullied at school and had lost her confidence. At first Alice was very quiet and just shelved books, hanging her head so no-one could see her. After several months she started to come out of her shell

a little. Now she is much more confident - chatting away to staff and customers! Alice says volunteering made her realise that she is not defined by the bullies at school and is valued in her own right. She has taken up new activities outside of school and made great new friendship groups".

"Rafa wanted to study Software Engineering and needed some experience to put on his university application. He volunteered to run Digital Support sessions. He was a whizz with the latest technology and enjoyed showing people how to set up and use their new smartphones and tablets. The older people on the course really enjoyed his company and enthusiasm."

Community Members shaping our story

Community Members shape Explore, now and into the future, by taking an active interest in our plans, policies and strategic direction, and sharing their ideas about how we can achieve even more for our community.

Any library member over 16 can join as a Community Member. They receive regular updates about Explore, can elect directors and stand for election themselves. Community Members had a chance to elect two new directors to the board in 2022. We were delighted that six people put themselves forward for election – Rosemary Cook and Luke Castle received the most votes with the result announced at the AGM on 5 September.

Friends shaping our story

Friends groups shape Explore in their local community. They are independent charitable bodies and support us through regular fundraising to improve their local library, or by lending a hand in practical ways - from plumbing to painting to planting and more! They know their local library staff and their local area and can provide honest feedback in a context of mutual trust.

Not just a Friends group but a group of friends.

Our longest standing Friends group is based at Dunnington Library. Activities planned and run by the Friends have become firm fixtures in the village calendar: the Annual Quiz is always a sell-out, and the monthly coffee morning brings the community together while raising funds for the library. The Friends also run regular booksales and organise activities for children.

Lorraine, the library manager says:

“The Friends group has two important strands - their fundraising helps us redecorate and refurbish the library, and they also advocate for us in the community and raise awareness through a popular programme of events.”

“I specially want to thank committee members Maureen, Julie and Chris who stepped down this year after eight years of loyal service. But even though they have retired from the committee, they are still helping out at friends events and volunteering in the library!”



Bishopthorpe Library Friends meet regularly and organise a programme of activities.

These range from talks on various subjects, exhibitions, retro games, community jigsaw and a choir. Some events raise money for the library or help raise awareness of the library as a valuable local resource. The group could not meet during the covid 19 pandemic, but Friends and volunteers are relieved to be back to normal in 2023.





- <1% Sundry expenses and interest payments




As we began to recover after the pandemic, new challenges posed by the increased cost of living once again impacted the wellbeing and resilience of individuals, families and communities in York.

Explore offered warm, welcoming spaces for everyone and opportunities to try new experiences, read for wellbeing, enjoy fun activities and connect with other people. In every community across the city of York, our libraries, archives and reading cafes create a shared, inclusive sense of place where people of all ages can connect and know they belong. Explore received a contract sum of £2.5 million from City of York Council to

provide a library and archive service for York and needed to raise a further £1.2 million to meet costs and continue to thrive in 2022. The impact of the increased cost of living has proved challenging and continues to be so with 111% increase in utility costs alone. The additional support we have received from funders, sponsors, from everyone who used our cafes or gave a donation has been, and continues to be, vital and we thank you for your support.

Information and Digital Support

As well as regular digital support, we helped people access Household Support Payment and Energy Rebate Payments on-line, we also signposted to financial support and food banks through our website. Explore provides the right information at the right time as well as a warm welcoming space for all.

York: a digitally inclusive city for all
100% Digital York takes a collaborative approach to achieving its ambition of a digitally inclusive city for all. Explore is lead partner with City of York Council. We re-launched digital support sessions at all Explore Centres to complement this work. The partnership works with community groups and organisations to introduce digital inclusion as a tool to achieve their aims and to support identified outcomes and impact. Through the partnership, residents who meet specific criteria can access equipment through the IT Re-Use Scheme, free connectivity through the Good Things Foundation National Databank scheme, as well as the opportunity to grow their confidence through digital support sessions.




Sharing the Joy (of Reading)

Connecting with each other through a shared joy of reading supports a sense of wellbeing, sparks an excitement to read and opens up a world of imagination. People of all ages had the opportunity to do just that through two reading programmes in 2022.

The Big City Read

The aim of the Big City Read is to get the whole city of York reading the same book at the same time, bring people together to talk about it and invite them to join in with inspiring events and activities created around the themes of the book. Behind the Scenes at the Museum as a Big City Read title had been an obvious choice for quite some time.

By reading books and attending an exciting range of events and activities, Gadgeteers sparked children's curiosity about the world around them and encouraged them to feed their imaginations. They were boggled by brilliant facts, gazed at the stars, and were inspired to create and invent. **Our programme of free Summer Reading Challenge events and support for disadvantaged children was made possible by funding from York Children's Trust and The Victoria Wood Foundation.**

Wood Owl and the Box of Wonders: affordable live theatre

Families in York affected by the cost-of-living crisis were able to attend a quality Christmas production this year thanks to £3,000 charitable funding. Explore successfully applied for the grant and worked with Hoglets Theatre to put on Christmas performances in schools and libraries with each child receiving a free book.

Two schools were offered a free performance of Wood Owl and the Box of Wonders and a puppet-making workshop at school. They didn’t need to pay transport costs so this made it easier for them to participate. A further 11 performances were held in eight libraries during the Christmas holidays.

Wood Owl and the Box of Wonders was funded by The Hobson’s Charity.



Connecting People and Communities

Our City Hub: Made by the community for the community

Ukrainian Independence Day: celebrating through culture and song

The celebration of Ukraine included workshops and talks about the country's history, culture and literature. The day also saw the official launch of the York Ukrainian Society which represents the needs and aspirations of the local Ukrainian community. A singer packed out the Marriott Room singing traditional songs and the Ukrainian national anthem, typical snacks were served, and the Lord Mayor of York was in attendance

Speaking English 16 two-hour lessons were delivered to beginner and intermediate groups. 85 people attended between June and December and 45 still attend regularly.

The archive team focused on the theme of historical maps in York as part of Residents' Festival. The two events complemented each other and gave residents of all ages the opportunity to engage with York's past. Map Attack! Lego City of Wonder invited families to imagine historic York and design the York of the future using Lego, while Mapping Historic York was an exhibition of original maps and plans of the city.

Supporting Wellbeing

Explore responded by providing warm, welcoming spaces for everyone and opportunities to try new experiences, to read for wellbeing, to enjoy fun activities and connect with other people.

Tabitha: Big City Read Artist in Residence

We hosted four workshops at Explore centres, to develop Tabitha Grove’s solo piece *Them There Then That* followed by performances at five libraries. The aim of Tabitha’s residency and performance was to help audiences connect with stories found

in books in a new way. Tabitha created a thoughtful, honest, and poignant piece about her own stories of mental health and loss, delivered with utmost professionalism. Audience sizes grew as the mini-tour progressed and many who had booked a free ticket donated after the performance - testament to how much they enjoyed and were moved by it, some to tears.

Your Libraries: Shaped with You

Libraries co-located in the community, shaped by the community. A shared vision developed with communities of welcoming, safe, inclusive places accessible to everyone, and where everyone feels welcome. A place where organisations work together with the community and make a difference every day.

Haxby & Wigginton: open at last

Our new library and reading café opened on 4 January 2023 with more books, free Wi-Fi and computers, and an exciting programme of events and activities for all ages. Local residents participated in the planning and design and the Friends group contributed funds for furniture in the children's library. Co-location in Oaken Grove Community Centre means we work closely with Haxby and Wigginton Youth and Community Association and as we deepen our partnership we will be able to engage with even more people from local communities.



Clifton Explore: growing forward with our community

A major construction project, funded by a multi million pound investment from City of York Council will transform the original Clifton Without Junior School site. The new Explore Centre will be five times larger than the existing library. Its 1,400 square metres will offer space for 15,000 books, a reading café and a children's library, plus meeting rooms and other spaces. Organisations based at the centre will include The Snappy Trust, Accessible Arts and Media and York Learning all working in partnership with Explore to add value to the local community. At every stage of planning, we have kept up a conversation with local people, hearing from them about what they want to see, developing and refining plans for the whole site together. Clifton Explore will be made by the community for the community.

- Fully accessible library with comfortable seating, space for quiet study, and separate spaces for children and young people
- Free PCs to use
- Flexible shelving and furniture in the main library which can transform into a 150-seat performance space
- Reading café
- Meeting rooms, fitted out with the latest technology
- Collaborative discussions with local people to plan the garden and outdoor space
- Environmentally friendly features including solar panels and electric charging bays
- Cycle and car parking, accessible parking spaces and storage for buggies and pushchairs




